# Background



- \* Leen Organics is based near Crusheen, Co. Clare
- Farming on 4 acres since 1997
- .75 of an acre of vegetables outside
- \* .25 of an acre under plastic
- \* .75 of an acre for 45 hens
- The rest of the land is bog, scrub and two houses

### Situation

- Land is on a drumlin facing South East
- Soil type; is clay loam going to mineral bog soil
- \* Elevation; 80 metres above sea level
- Annual Rainfall 928mm 31in at Shannon airport



# History of enterprise

- Started with laying hens in 1998
- \* 25 Hy- Line at 18 weeks point of lay
- Subsequently increased to 45 with next flock
- Selling at Farmers' Market and through a shop
- Have kept up to 100 hens but was overstocked
- \* The last flock I got were Blackrock reared from day old chicks

# Features of the system

- \* The use of two rotated paddocks
- Mobile electric fences for maximum flexibility when grazing
- Trees planted to replicate the hens natural environment
- \* Same age flock reared on the farm
- \* 45 hens in total

### Advantages



- Very saleable product
- Brings people to the market stall
- Extra income from land that would not really be farmed otherwise
- Good to have some livestock
- Close as could get to a mixed farm on this scale

# Advantages

- Produce manure (valuable commodity)
- Eat slugs (some breeds better than others at this)
- Eat waste and surplus produce and weeds
- Run on vegetable fields in winter/spring
- Good way of incorporating green manures
- Keep the grass down in the summer



# Disdvantages

- \* Can make a mess especially in prolonged wet weather
- Need attention morning and evening
- Prone to predation
- \* Eggs get dirty and have to be cleaned for sale
- Hen feed not very sustainable as coming long distance from all over the world
- \* Time consuming and expensive replacing flock
- Cost of feedstuffs
- Availability of stock especially organic
- Attract vermin



- Approximately 100€ per bird a year gross profit after cost of feed and cost of chick are taken into account
- This does not account for labour or indirect costs such as housing, fencing etc. which will be written off over a longer period of time



# Issues for the future

- Need to expand my enterprise but no land on which to do this
- The need to find a breed suitable to organic farming needs
- Further research into alternative diets for poultry that feedstuffs can be produced locally
- Research into the optimum herbage for hens
